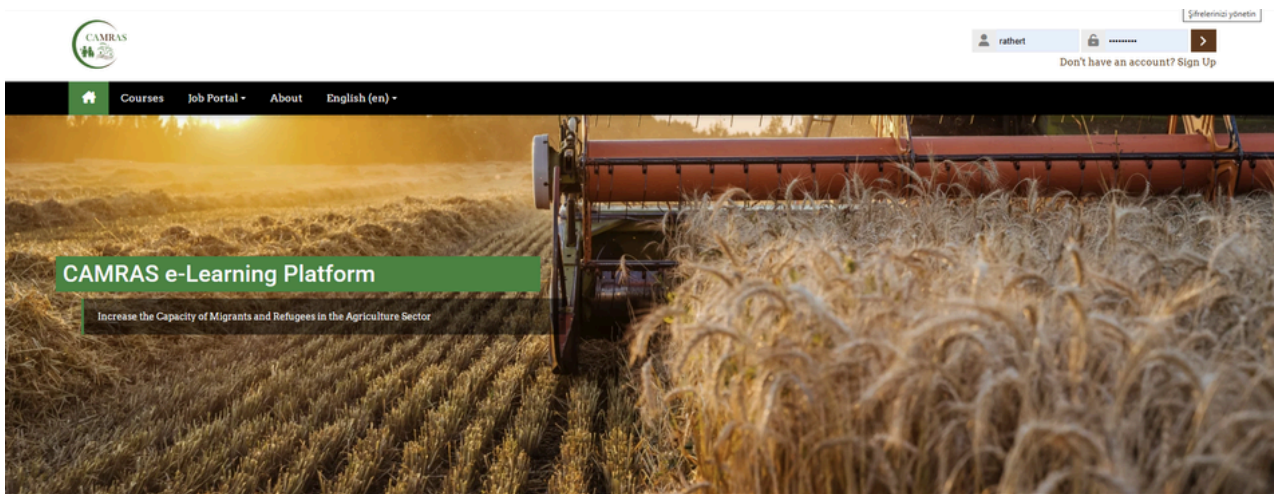
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The fifth and final CAMRAS Newsletter is out!

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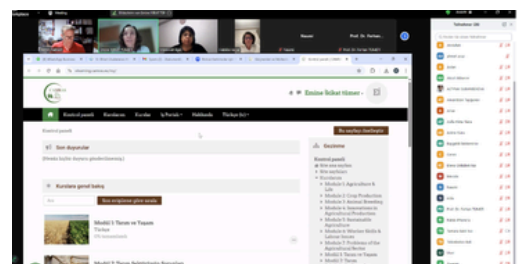
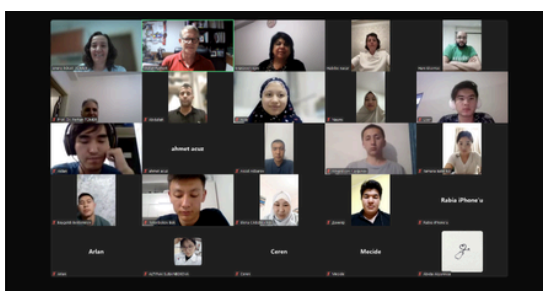
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CAMRAS Training Sessions: Stengthening Migrants and Refugees and Supporting Access to the Platform

Given the digital challenges faced by many participants, the partners organised face-to-face and online training. Here are some spotlights:

- KSU delivered face-to-face training on December 25, 2024 to 46 trainees and online training on May 14, 2025 to 23 trainees of varous nationalities to inform them about today's farming practices and guide them through the e-learning platform. The KSU team gave practical tips, and the trainees completed successfully modules of the training programme.



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- AMSED organized its second in-person training on May 20, 2025, in Strasbourg. The goal went beyond simply presenting the platform, it was also about enabling access. During the session, 20 participants from Tunisia, Sri Lanka, Nigeria, Algeria, Armenia, received support to create their own accounts, learn basic computer use and navigate through the CAMRAS platform with confidence.



- ILA delivered training in Amsterdam on February 17, 2025 to 19 participants from a variety of professional backgrounds, including youth workers who support migrants, representatives from local agricultural organizations, volunteers from the municipality, university students focusing on social integration, and small business owners with immigrant backgrounds. This diverse cohort was brought together to build a strong local network of ambassadors for the CAMRAS project.



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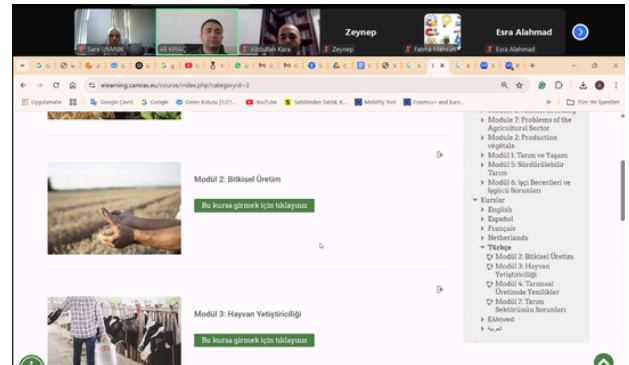


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- On October 11, 2024, Inercia Digital hosted in-person training in Spain for 13 newly arrived migrants and refugees from Senegal, Gambia, Mali, Côte d'Ivoire, and Syria. Many participants faced digital illiteracy and language barriers. With the help of local NGOs (ACCEM Huelva and Don Bosco Huelva), an introductory module on basic digital skills was delivered, concluding with participants receiving a certificate for their learning.
- TENGO provided face-to-face training on March 12, 2025, to 12 migrants and refugees (M/R) to enhance their capacities in the agricultural sector. At the end of the training, the M/R participants received their certificates and were provided with information on challenges and solutions in the agricultural sector. Additionally, on May 9, 2025, a practical online training session was held for 18 Syrian refugee participants to improve their digital skills. This session focused on registering on the CAMRAS platform and accessing the educational materials.



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The sessions reported on in this newsletter and the ones delivered by the other partners revealed a clear need for ongoing assistance and simplified instructions, which proved essential for helping participants complete the modules successfully. At the end of both trainings, participants expressed sincere gratitude and a high level of satisfaction with the support and content offered.



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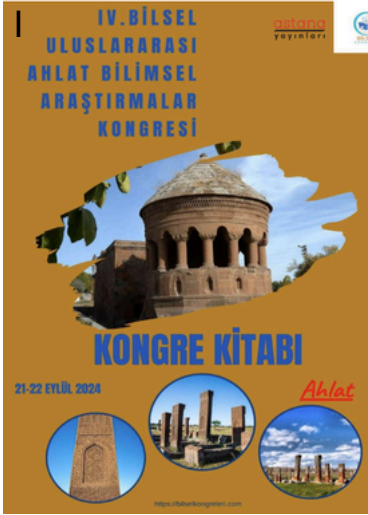
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Disseminate Project Outcomes to Academia

- 'Digital Age: Innovations in Energy, Ecology, Construction and Transport', a conference organised by Osh University of Technology in Osh, Kyrgyzstan, on May 23, 2025.

Reporting on the vocational education delivered throughout the project, she underlined the importance of Erasmus+ projects to arrive at well-being, prosperity and peace worldwide and at the local level.

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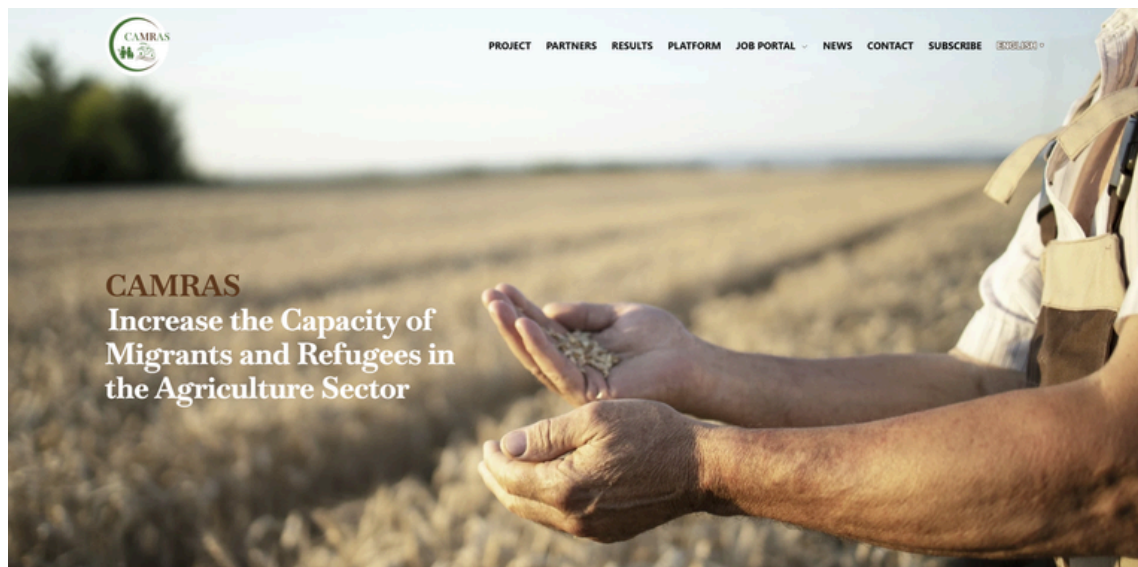
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A Journey Ends, but the Project Evolves...
